


# **Springfield Lodge**

2 & 4 Heathfield Road are being redeveloped as flats (2019).



#### **Thornsett House**

This was the home of George Crapper, plumber, eldest brother of the betterknown Thomas Crapper, plumber to royalty, improver of sanitary systems and pioneer of bathroom showrooms commemorated by a blue plaque on his house in Thornsett Road in Anerley. Thornsett a place in Yorkshire - Crapper family all born in Yorkshire so probably had some family meaning.




Glaisdale is a beauty spot in the Esk Valley in North Yorkshire

#### Rosecroft

There are various places with this name - also a general 'evocative' name suggesting roses and rural scene (croft a rustic dwelling).

#### **Briardene**

Also an evocative name - 'dene' a deep valley. Numerous Briardenes, notably near Windermere in the Lake District, also near Truro in Cornwall.

#### Linden Villa [58]

Linden another name for lime tree. Originally built as the park-keeper's house.

#### Stanley Villa [60]

Could be a reference to the famous Stanley who found Dr Livingstone in Africa in 1871? [this house later The Dell?].

This pair, now 58 and 60
Heathfield Road were built
long before the surrounding
houses and were considered
part of Avenue Crescent for
a time.

Built in 20th century. No indication these had names; but some Heathfield Road house names which have yet to be pinpointed and may be in this section of the road are Brockhurst, Elstree, Kenmore and Desford places in Hampshire, Hertfordshire, Scotland and Leicestershire respectively. Somewhere in Heathfield Road there was also a pair of semi-detached houses called **Brookwood** and Elmhurst.

### **Gorphwysfa Warlow**

Destroyed by direct hit by a bomb on night of 28 Oct. 1940. The name is Welsh for 'Warlow's resting-place'.

Elizabeth Warlow, President in 1904 of Acton Esperanto Group designed the house herself and was resident from about 1880 until her death in 1920.

Flats called James Welch Court are there now.
